A clone of *Dendrocalamus strictus* (P. I. G. 2846) grown from seeds received from Dehra Dun, India, in 1927. The somewhat sinuous, thick-walled-to-solid, erect culms, 45 feet or more high and with nodding tips, make a very compact clump. The culm sheaths are stiffly coriaceous.
